CLASS HISTORY

In the third and fortieth year of the nineteenth century of our Lord, in the eight month and on the seventh day of the month there entered into this Land of Learning nineteen seekers after Knowledge who were as follows Thomas Bartholoma, Vernice Carlock, Wilma DeGarmo, Leon Douglass, Twilla Drumm, Dale Faylor, Wyoma Hoover, Calvin Kuhns, Gerald Mendenhall, Bonny Perry, Dorothy Scrivner, Joy Smock, Violet Trembly, Alice Tucker, David Tucker, Hugh Wall, Bob Yost, Kathleen Zuege, and Rudy Zwegardt.

All Freshmen were timid and green. My! but that assembly looked big, but as time went on we gained confidence (too much, Mr. Jones?) At the first of the year an all High School Party was held, when the Freshman boys were initiated by the "spanking machine." But the girls weren't initiated, (lucky kids).

We had a variety of teachers this year. R. E. Slattery was Supt., W. R. Jones was Principal, Mr. Weaver, taught the first semester and Mrs. Hutchinson the second semester.

During the first semester the High School held a hay rack ride west of town. We roasted weiners and sang, and had a swell time.

Thomas Bartholoma and Alice Tucker discontinued their schooling during the first semester and Joy Smock dropped school during the second semester.

The last day of school the High School had a picnic at Hi Banks. Two of the Freshman girls had their own picnic with two Sophs.

When the school doors were opened for another year Wyoma Hoover was not with us. Our teachers were W. R. Jones, Supt., Mrs. Polen, Principal, and Mrs. Roach. This year the Sophomers entertained the two Seniors at a party.

One certain Friday when the Soph. were to sing for the assembly. The boys didn't appear--until 10 o'clock.

During this year Vernice Carlock moved to Wray and David Tucker dropped school.

The last day of school we went to Mendenhall's Hatchery north of town We played ball, swam, went boat riding, waded in the creek, and had a good lunch. We all had a super time.

The next September there were twelve Juniors. In November we ordered our rings and pins which came February 21, 1946. On March 28, 1946 we presented the play "Henry Tells the Truth", May 9th the Juniors gave in honor of the Seniors a banquet in which the theme was "Sunrise not Sunset" Mr. Jefferies was our Sponsor.

Our teachers were, W. R. Jones, Supt., Mr. Jefferies, Principal, and Mrs. Polen.

Bonny Perry and Hughie Wall dropped by the way side at the end of the first semester. Rudy Zwegardt dropped during the second semester.

On the last day of school the High School went to Rock Creek.

As we enter our Senior year it is the most eventful and exciting year. Gerald Mendenhall was not with us. He moved to Yuma, Colorado. Bob Yost went to Campion Academy, Loveland, Colorado, for his last year.

In the first six weeks we had an all school party for the purpose of initiating the Freshmen. During the second six weeks we had a hay rack ride north of town.

Mr. Samples took the Juniors and Seniors to Benkelman to District Court.

On April 24, 1947 the Juniors gave us a FORMAL Banquet. The seniors presented a play "Don't Darken My Door", to raise money for their Sneak Day

The closing events were: Class Night, May 16, 1947; Baccalaureate May 18, 1947; Commencement May 21, 1947.

IN MEMORIAM

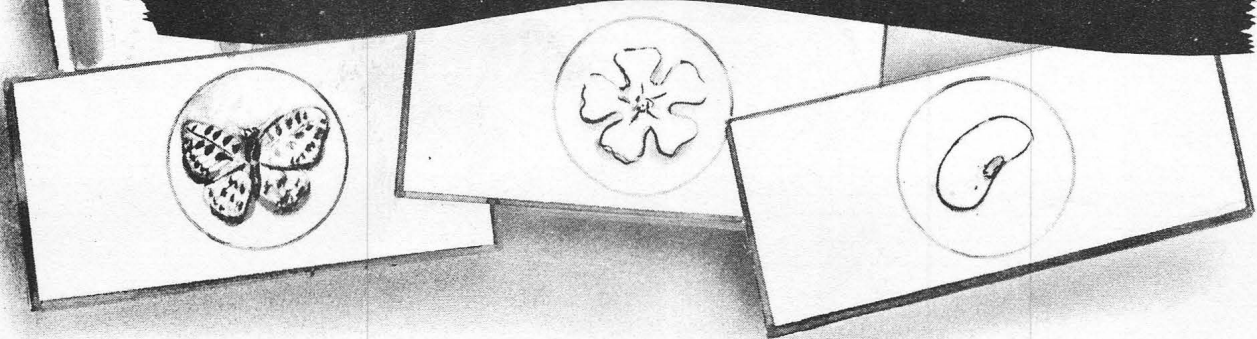

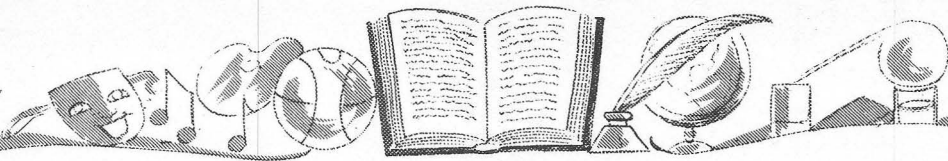

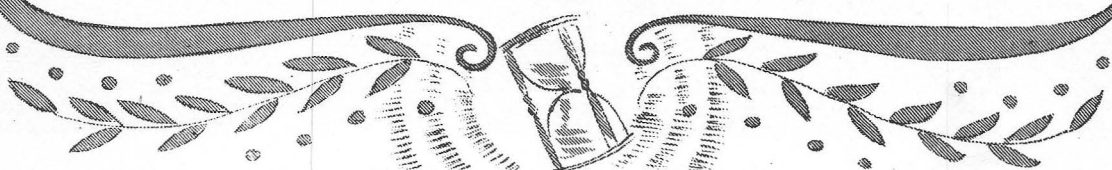
The operetta "Red Candles," was presented to a large crowd by the entire grade school December 12, 1946

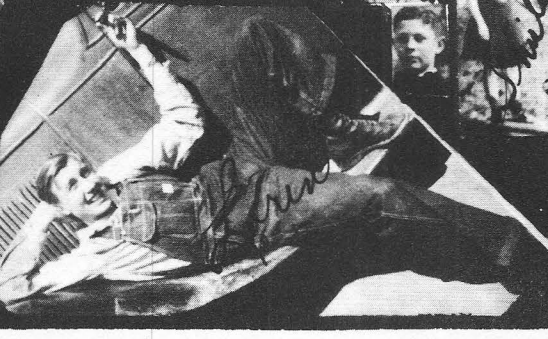
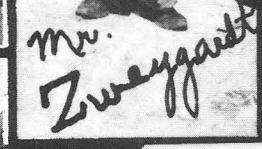
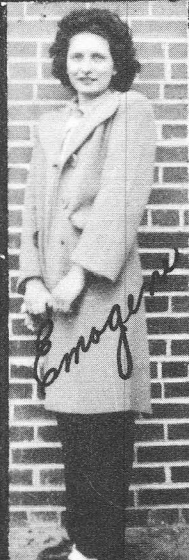
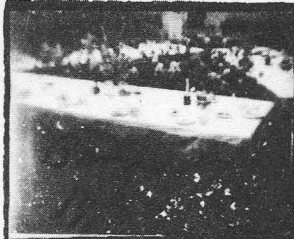
Hayes Center vs. Haigler

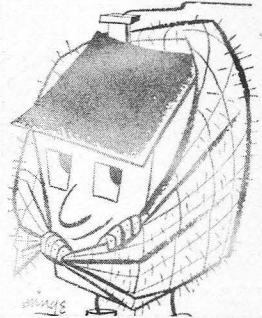
