Our teachers were: Mrs'. Charles Roach, Mrs'. Thelma Polen-Principal, and Mr. William R', Jones-Supt'.

Our class was one of the luckier ones, as we weren't initiated, that is we weren't all iniated Glenard was pickedby the upper classmenfor a private initiation and was seated on the fountain.

Kenneth Bartholoma and Max Wall had dropped out by the end of the first semester During our freshman year, many parties, love affairs and other school activities had passed and all was behing us'.

In September of 1945, we started back to school as Sophomores. JoAnn King, Milton King and Lila Stevens had moved during the summer.

Joy Smock started withus that year and Evan Samples joinedus at the end of the first six weeks'Our teachers were: Mr, Robert Jeffries, Mrs, Carl Polen--Principal, and Mr . Brooks, of the Brooks Studios in McCook, took the senior pictures of both the Laird and the Haigler classes.

As this is written there are several events to come before our school days at Haigler are over. The Junior Senior banquet will be given on April 14. Baccalaureate services will be given on Nay 16, 1948 and Commencement on May 19, 1948. Of course there will be sneak day too but only Seniors can know when that will be,

At any rate we will soon be through with our schooling in Haigler'. Some will go on to institutions of higher learning others will go from here directly into their life work, but regardless of where we are we will always remember our days at Haigler High School.
