


DEDICATION

Our class was one of the luckier ones, as we weren't initiated, that is we weren't all iniated. Glenard was picked by the upper classmen for a private initiation and was seated on the fountain.

Kenneth Bartholoma and Max Wall had dropped out by the end of the first semester During our freshman year, many parties, love affairs and other school activities

had passed and all was behind us'.

In September of 1945, we started back to school as Sophomores. JoAnn King, Milton King and Lila Stevens had

Joy Smock started withus that year and Evan Samples joined us at the end of the first six weeks Our teachers were: Mr. Robert Jeffries, Mrs. Carl Polen--Principal, and Mr. Jones-Superintendent, For some unknown reason, our class was thought of as being one of the best-acting classes, according to our teachers during both our fresh-

man and Sophomore years.

We presented our Junior play "Margery is Eighteen" on December 18, 1946, after which our leading lady, Joy Smock quit school to take the leading part in her own home as a housewife. Our Junior and Senior banquet was given on Thursday evening, April 24, 1947. The theme was Spanish and everything was made to resemble a Spanish patio. When the banquet was over the Junior and Senior classes went to a dance in Benkelman.

CLASS HISTORY(Cont)



Atany rate we will soon be through with our schooling in Haigler'. Some will go on to institutions of higher learning, others will go from here directly into their life work, but regardless of where we are we will always remember our days at Haigler High School.

cerning the younger generation.




makes her home with her daughter.







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


The above illustration shows the 24" x 36" size DAV-SON Cork Back Bulletin Board, plain, without glass door. See price list.
