The last day of school the student body went to Rock Creek for a picnic. Everyone had a nice time.

When we started back to school the next year, Jim Fahnholz and Lola Griffin were not with us. That year Kathryn Beeson came from Laird to join our Sophomore Class. Charles Childers came from Yuma to join our ranks at the first of the second semester. Our teachers that year were Mr. Jones, Mr. Samples, and Mrs. Roach.

The last day of school we went to Wray. Much to our disappointment, it rained that day, but everyone had a pretty good time.

The next September there were twelve Juniors. During the first semester we lost two members of our class. Naoma Brunick moved to Wray and Rosella Tucker dropped school to be married.

In October we ordered our rings, which arrived the following June. On February 27 we presented the play "Something Old, Something New." On April 14 the Juniors gave a banquetin honor of the Seniors.
