

Walter P. Kriemelmeyer

The Seniors of 1951 dedicate our annual to our sponsor and friend, W.P. Kriemeleyer. He came here this year after having taught at Farnam, Nebraska, for the past 10 years.

Mr. Kriemelmeyer was born in Cambridge, Nebraska, on February 12, 1898. He graduated from Cambridge High School in 1916, where he was active in football all 4 years.

He entered the University of Nebraska in 1916, attended 2 years, and then entered the U. S. Army, where he served until December of 1918. After his discharge he farmed, and taught in a country school south of Eckley, Colorado, until 1925, when he returned to the University and graduated in 1927. He was active in aports all 4 years of college, lettering 3 years in football and 2 years in track.

He taught and coached in Haxtun, Colorado, and Bartley, Nebraska; he also was employed in a number of other jobs until he returned to his teaching in Farnam in 1940.

We, the Senior Class, wish him luck and success in the future years.







In the year 1947, there entered into Haigler High School thirteen pupils who were a slight shade of green. These were: Bob Kamla, Ellen Tracy, Don Brown, Dorothy Brown, Harry Redden, Kathleen Havlik, Dale Potthoff, Elgin Glendenning, Virginia Wall, DeLorise Workman, Leota Tucker, Blanche Redden and Vonda Davis. Three girls, Leota Tucker, Blanche Redden, and Vonda Davis dropped out of school and got married.

We had an initiation of course, that we couldn't avoid. The girls had to braid their hair in thirteen pigtails and tie a green ribbon to each. Their jeans were rolled above their knees, while their blouses were wrong-side-out. They had to wear anklets of different colors and weren't allowed to wear any make-up at all. The boys had to have their jeans rolled above their knees, disclosing black stockings held up at the knee by green ribbon garters. They had to have a green ribbon in their hair, shirts wrong-side-out, and they were lucky enough to get to wear make-up.

That night the upper-classmen gave us a party where we played games and were taken on a treasure hunt. The treasure was a big sack of bubble-gum. Besides the school party the social calendar for that year was as follows: a leap year party, chili supper given for the football boys, a formal dance given by the pep club, and the last-day-of-school picnic at Horse Creek. Our teachers for that year were Mr. Jones, Mrs. Whitney, and Mr. Clements.

Our second year began much better as we were not green anymore, but very confident in our ability. This was a busy year for us, as Don, Bob, and Harry played football and all the boys went out for basket-ball. All of the girls were in pep club. Dorothy, Kathleen, and Virginia were in glee-club. Dorothy and Kathleen were cheer leaders.

Our class numbered eleven at the first of the year, but decreased again when Hazelann Hamilton moved to Lincoln in the latter part of February. During that year, the sophomores enjoyed a theatre party at Wray. The show that we saw was "The Babe Ruth Story." We had lots of fun!

At the end of the year, we had a picnic dinner at Kamla's grove and then went to Mahon's swimming. We had a hayrack ride and went to Mahon's grove where we enjoyed a weiner roast and watermelons. Our teachers were Ed Rowley, who was also our class sponsor, and Mr. and Mrs. Joe Horner.

Our Junior year was one of the most eventful years in our school days. We had an all school party at the time of Freshman Initiation, and a hayrack ride to Horse Creek Three of the Junior girls, Dorothy, Kathleen, and Virginia, were on the annual staff to gain experience for the next year. They helped on the advertising part of the 1950 annual.



We received our rings on February 7, and were we ever proud of them. All of the boys got plain gold but Dale. He and the girls ordered black onyx stones. We presented our Junior play "Just Ducky," on April 21. This play drew a lot of fame and compliments to our class and, of course, we thought it was excellent.

On May 2, we gave a banquet for the seniors. We carried out a western theme, and decorated the Legion Hall appropriately with such things as sagebrush, saddles, brands, and lanterns. The meal, which was prepared by the Juniors' mothers, was also in the western mood. We danced afterward to the music of Mr. and Mrs. Horner. At the end of that year we went to Kamla's for a picnic dinner, then scattered, to various points of interest. Our teachers for our Junior year were Mr. Horner, Mrs. Kirkpatrick, and Mr. Swallow.

In the fall of 1950, we started the last year of our carefree high-school days. Out of the thirteen students who began the Freshman year, four girls and all the boys are graduating. Harry and Bob are the only students who have gone all twelve years at Haigler. Delorise Workman, who was one of our classmates, moved to Max. Also Ira Long, Jr., who had been with us since our Junior year, left school in October. This left us with nine students.

On October 19, Mr. Brooks took the Seniors pictures. We received them January 16, 1951. They are very good and will add considerably to the wall in the assembly next year. We started work on our Senior Annual the second semester. The money which we made was used to cover the expenses of our sneak day. The Freshmen gave an all-school party that everyone enjoyed very much.

We Seniors planned a unique initiation for the Freshman which lasted a week. Everyone enjoyed the week (except, maybe, the 'Freshmen.) The faculty for our Senior year was composed of three new teachers; Mr. Kriemelmeyer--Superintendent; Mr. France--Principal; and Miss Potts.

Baccalaureate services were held Sunday, May 13. Commencement exercises were held Thursday, May 17, 1951.






